



Greetings Brothers and Sisters,

I pray the Great Architect of the Universe continues to bless, guide, and protect you and your families. If you all would allow me a few moments of your time, I would like to share my thoughts on leadership and a few qualities leaders should possess.

First and foremost, we must ask ourselves what is leadership? According to the Oxford dictionary leadership is "The action of leading a group of people or an organization". Although I agree, I would say that leadership is the act of "SERVING", a group of people or an organization, which is in accord with the language used during our annual elections. Once the nominations have been made and the ballots cast, the presiding officer announces to the Brother or Sisters that they have been elected to "SERVE" as Worshipful Master, Most Ancient Matron or Worthy Matron, etc. for the ensuing Masonic year. Most of us associate leadership with the titles and positions that are held within our respective local, district, state, and national Masonic bodies. However, leadership is not the actual titles or positions that we hold. Simply put, "LEADERSHIP IS SERVITUDE AND SERVITUDE IS LEADERSHIP". I am a fond believer in the bigger the title you have, the bigger the "SERVANT" you should be. Too often when we're elected or appointed to positions, our egos show up and we are looking to be served, not to serve. It's been said, if you really want to know the true character of a person, give them some power or money, and watch them reveal their true selves. If they were truly humble before receiving either of the two, then they will display even more humility. But, if they were pretending to be humble, then they will reveal the opposite, which is never good for any organization.

Furthermore, a leader is a visionary who knows from whence they came, where they are now, where they want to go in the future. More importantly, they know how to communicate their vision with purpose, passion and clarity to the other officers and members, in order to achieve the desired results. As a side note, there is a huge difference between having a vision and having a personal agenda. If a leader has a vision, the organization will succeed, but if they have a personal agenda, the organization will most likely suffer.

Leaders have integrity and rely on their core values to guide their decision making, decorum, and interactions. Although they know that having integrity won't make them a leader, they also understand that without integrity they will never be one. Effective leaders possess a strong sense of character, keep their promises, communicate openly, and honestly, and are respected for being authentic, moral, and rational.

Leaders know that effective communication is more than giving an attentive ear and responding appropriately. It includes sharingimportant information, asking for opinions, being transparent and communicating/connecting effectively with different personalities, who may be from different social, religious, education and economic backgrounds.

#### Love Chapel Lodge #558 Donates To Victims of EF2 Tornado Of Hughes Springs, Texas

**HUGHES SPRINGS**, **TEXAS** – On the evening of Friday, November 4<sup>th</sup> an EF2 tornado hit the small East Texas town of Hughes Springs causing damage and destruction to homes and buildings. City Hall and the fire department appeared to be total losses during this weather event. Hughes Springs is the home city of Love Chapel Lodge #558.

In March 2022, a similar incident happened southwest of this city in the Lake O' the Pines area. In late spring, Love Chapel Lodge acknowledged a need to construct a plan to provide some level of assistance and have a community presence during such events in the lodge's vicinity. Unbeknownst to recently raised Brother Perry Kaigler, who volunteered to take the lead, that an opportunity would come so soon to assist the community with an immediate need. By mid-summer, information was culminated and stored, complete with contact information regarding county emergency preparedness, local staging areas, etc. Ironically, the November tornado affected the very people and locations that were identified in area's severe weather contingency plan. The First Assembly of God Church was the designated location to accept, inventory and distribute the community donations. When contacted regarding community need, a request was made for assorted batteries, candles, flashlights and lanterns which the lodge graciously donated on November 7<sup>th</sup>.

HUGHES SPRINGS, TEXAS – On the evening of Saturday, December 3<sup>rd</sup>, Love Chapel Lodge #558 participated in the town's annual Christmas parade. Community kids were encouraged to participate with the brethren by waving and throwing candy to the crowd of parade goers. All got a good belly laugh when reminded of a conversation, years earlier, with Brother T.L. Morrow, the oldest member of the craft:

**Brother Morrow:** "Well, I must say something,

men!"

Brother Denmark: "What's that T.L.?

**Brother Morrow:** "That was the best parade that

I have ever been in."

Brother Bo Hopkins: "Oh yeah?"

W.M. Hancock: "Hey T.L.!"

Brother Morrow: "Yeah, Bruh "Wishful"?

W.M. Hancock: "Exactly, how many parades

have you been in?"

Brother Morrow: "Well, Just one now!"



Comments were made that reminded the Brothers of the significance of such public participation. Many present had remembered from years earlier the surprised looks and straightened posture and prideful looks on the face of community members and kinfolks as they recognized the Lodge making its first appearance in such an event. As this sight was unforgettable, the feeling was undeniable. Just minutes earlier though, local newspaper personnel had seemed awestruck at the presence of the fully-regailed craft. One young reporter reluctantly asked would the craft be singing or providing entertainment. Not offended by the question, the Worshipful Master seized the opportunity to enlighten the youthful reporter and the crowd that had seemed the gather with similar questions but dared to as. And there were other occasions when members of the other lodge in town would guestion members of the Love Chapel as to their location and longevity in the community. Amidst the fun and festivities of a parade, these occasions were/are seen as opportunities to educate the public on masonry in general, Love Chapel Lodge in particular and escalate its presence in the community.

#### "Where cordiality knows no bounds"!



## District 23, Prince Hall Masons Restoring a Legacy of Lodge and Community

The philanthropy of Julius Rosenwald in collaboration with Booker T. Washington is believed to one of the most significant contributions to the education of African Americans. For the millions of African Americans without adequate schools, books and other necessities, the Rosenwald Foundation helped fund thousands of schools across the American South during the first half of the 20th century. Where Booker T. Washington of the Tuskegee Institute helped to bring about the building of several small schools, first in rural Alabama. It was the Carver Vocational High School for African Americans in Lockhart, Texas. Built nearly one hundred years ago in 1923, Carver Vocational High School was not just the single choice for education for local African Americans, but it was also considered a safe space. A

place where children would find their identity, discovery their purpose, all while escaping the struggles of the time. A place where dedicated teachers nurtured and encouraged African American children to excel.

In 1964, the school witnessed its last graduating class, as it closed that year due to public school integration. The school had been the home of the local Head Start Program and Royal Feast Masonic Lodge #214, Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Texas. Aging membership of Royal Feast Masonic Lodge #214 led to its inactivation and the building has become the subject of vandalism and graffiti.

The Legacy of Lodge and Community

With the support of the Prince Hall Charitable Foundation, local community members and Carver graduates, Prince Hall Masons continue to keep the grounds and conduct repairs. This has helped a great deal to counter the vandalism and mitigate the other damages from wear and

tear. The periodic clean ups and repairs often became an "all hands" efforts from people and agents from surrounding

areas. Efforts which have allowed local community members to host community wide events at the Carver Vocational High School, with continued hopes of someday soon, having the school restored to function as an Archives, Museum and Learning Center. The most recent event was a community Health Expo lead by Mrs. Hattie Carter, which became the genesis of discussions for a possible Juneteenth event in 2023.

Under the guidance of Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master Michael T. Anderson, the restoration of the Carver Vocational High School has been a focal point of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Charitable Foundation, District 23 PHA Masons, local community leaders and alumni. The

leadership of the community, alumni, and Prince Hall Masons has called for the establishment of a committee, with the charge of carrying out efforts necessary to restore the building, while memorializing the grounds, maintaining the history of the Carver Vocational High School, and revitalizing Prince Hall Masonry in the Lockhart and surrounding areas.

The Prince Hall Charitable Foundation, which is a (501c3) communitybased service-oriented organization whose goal is to restore the formerly

G.W. Carver High School to a mixed-use space that builds community recovery and resiliency in Caldwell County, Lockhart, Texas by partnering with helping agencies to meet the needs and address challenges. The building would house training programs supporting community and commercial entities that will improve mental, physical, technical, social, and economic resilience.

Quoting Ziggy Marley, "The African-American community still needs to come together as one and stand up for rights of the people and of what's happening in their culture, their community." The Brothers of District 23 under the direction of Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master Michael Anderson, Right Worshipful Grand Junior Warden Frank Jackson and "The Prince Hall

Charitable Foundation's goal is to go beyond the physical edifice but together with the community work towards the revitalization of a safe space to initiate and support programs that strengthens the community, by providing a place to acquire new skills, to preserve and protect its historical records and memorabilia while transcending the exigencies of the times. We want to invest in the potential of community residences and provide a new space to the community. 




