

- 2. Terms for Fundraising
- 3. Conditions for Groundskeeping

The meeting concluded with a pivotal moment: the Round Rock Cemetery Association officially relinquished a detailed map of the Round Rock Cemetery to the Lodge. This map specifically outlines the area of responsibility for the Lodge within the cemetery, which the two groups walked and surveyed together. This shared walkthrough not only deepened their understanding of the site but also reinforced the Lodge's role in maintaining and caring for the cemetery's historical significance. Additionally, the meeting culminated in the designation of Thomas H. Keithley Lodge No. 45 as official committee members of the Round Rock Cemetery Association.

CIBOLO, TEXAS – In an exciting step towards embracing technology, a group of 13 youth club members recently attended a class on artificial intelligence (AI) and learned how to use ChatGPT, a powerful AI language model developed by OpenAI. The class provided by Nick McGinnis, CDO & Founder, Nathan Golter, CEO & Founder of LeadAura Incorporated, was a mix of exploration, discovery, and hands-on creativity. As part of the session, the students built their own bot designed to find Minecraft cheat codes, sparking a wave of enthusiasm and curiosity about the world of AI and its potential uses.

Artificial intelligence, or AI, refers to machines designed to perform tasks that typically require human intelligence. These tasks include problem-solving, recognizing patterns, learning from data, and even understanding and generating natural language. AI models like ChatGPT can interpret and respond to human language, making them versatile tools for tasks like answering questions, writing, and even holding conversations.

ChatGPT, specifically, is a language model trained by OpenAl on a diverse range of internet text. Its design enables it to respond to user prompts in a conversational, human-like way. Whether the prompt is a math question, a creative writing prompt, or a programming challenge, ChatGPT can provide informative, creative, or even humorous responses. The youth club members found this particularly fascinating as it opened the door to creating tools and programs, like their Minecraft cheat code bot, that can perform specific tasks based on user queries.



Creating the Minecraft Cheat Code Bot

For the hands-on part of their lesson, the group decided to put their new knowledge of AI and ChatGPT to the test by creating a bot capable of finding Minecraft cheat codes. Minecraft, a popular sandbox video game, includes various "cheats" or special commands that players can use to enhance gameplay, discover resources, or add new elements to the game.

Using ChatGPT's language capabilities, the students took sequential steps to program a bot that would respond to queries for specific Minecraft cheat codes. For instance, users could ask the bot for commands to summon creatures, change weather, or access special items, and the bot would provide the relevant code. Building the bot taught the students about prompt engineering, a key concept in using language models like ChatGPT effectively. They learned how to design questions and commands that the bot could interpret to give accurate answers.

A Future Fueled by AI and Innovation

The training facilitators also provided helpful insights into potential for young people to leverage AI like ChatGPT extends far beyond just fun projects like Minecraft bots. The Buffalo Soldier Council No. 20's venture into AI with their Minecraft cheat code bot is a small but significant example of how young people can use technology to explore their interests and grow their skills. By learning about AI and creating tools that integrate ChatGPT, today's youth can empower themselves to take on challenges, build creative solutions, and even generate income. As AI technology becomes more accessible, the opportunities for young people to innovate and contribute to the future of technology will only continue to grow.

Their journey into AI reflects the potential for new generations to lead the way, blending creativity and technology to shape the future. With resources like ChatGPT at their fingertips, youth today have the tools to become not only the consumers of technology but also its creators, entrepreneurs, and pioneers.

The Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Texas (Julius Rosenwald) George Washington Carver Vocational High Restoration Project

Lockhart, Texas. After years of delays, The Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Texas (MWPHGLOTX) restoration project is finally moving forward with a sense of fulfillment. After years of planning and securing funding, The MWPHGLOTX started the first phase of the (Julius Rosenwald) George Washington Carver Vocational High Restoration Project on November 22nd, 2024, thanks to a three-million-dollar allocation from Texas Legislature.

The initiative to restore the building, which educated and served Black students in Lockhart from 1934 to 1964, is known as the Julius Rosenwald George Washington Carver Vocational High School Restoration Project. This project is supported by the MWPHGLOTX and aims to honor Julius Rosenwald, a philanthropist who financed over 5,000 schools for rural Black children in the South, and George Washington Carver, an esteemed scientist and educator who influenced many of the vocational courses offered at the school. The MWPHGLOTX Steering Committee has selected Carter Design and Associates, an Austin-based firm led by Donna D. Carter, FAIA, to develop a detailed project plan for restoring the George Washington Carver Vocational High School building. Specializing in architectural planning and restoration, CDA has experience revitalizing historic sites like the Ethiopian Star Lodge #308 in Snook, Texas. Their expertise in combining revitalization, historic preservation, and new construction makes them the ideal choice for our project.

We will maintain historical accuracy to preserve our building's original character. Grand Master Michael T. Anderson expressed his excitement that the project is starting after six years of planning. We selected the right firm and are confident in our direction. We will adhere to phased plans and partner with the community to determine the building's final state. This project is expected to take a minimum of 18 to 24 months.

The Prince Hall Charitable Foundation Committee is collaborating with various stakeholders to secure additional funding for the revitalization of the historic Carver Vocational High School and the surrounding area. This effort aims to memorialize the grounds, preserve the school's history, and rejuvenate Prince Hall Masonry in Lockhart and nearby areas.



Community leaders have been crucial for our progress. Ms. Hatti Carter has kept us informed about building activities, serving as a vital link for MWPHGLOTX's local engagements. Hatti, Past Master Homer Williams, Royal Feast Lodge #214, and Shirley Williams have long been involved in initiatives to revitalize their former school. All expressed their happiness at witnessing this high honor for the school and local community. Hatti said, "My soul is rejoicing" as I witness this day.

Our Lockhart Steering committee is chaired by Willie High Coleman, Chairman of the PHCF, under the direction of Grand Master Michael T. Anderson. The Steering Committee includes Deputy Grand Master Big Bryce Hardin, Right Worshipful Grand Senior Warden Frank Jackson, Right Worshipful Grand Junior Warden Ronald Gerac, Right Worshipful Grand Secretary T. C. Bittle, Right Worshipful Grand Treasurer Robert Datcher, Right Worshipful Grand Auditor Sam Hobbs Jr., Right Worshipful Grand Auditor Joseph Thomas III , *Worshipful* Otho Wilbur Sr., and Right Worshipful District Deputy Grand Master, District 23, Cliff Massey. 




Norris Wright Cuney Grand Chapter Observes Domestic Violence Awareness Month
